Leadership Reward



One of our goals in fifth grade is to become more responsible and lead by example.

Some important ways to show responsibility include:

- ✓ a charged device at the beginning of the day
- ✓ only use device for teacher-approved websites
- ✓ bring all materials for class (pencil, folder, binder, etc.)
- ✓ offer help to others
- ✓ no demerits

Each week, we will focus on a specific leadership skill (examples: effective communication, accountability, respect, etc.). Students who are observed using the leadership skill of the week will be placed on the leadership board and rewarded on Friday afternoons.

Shine Club nominations will be randomly selected each week from the leadership board.

We hope this inspires students to become more responsible as we prepare for middle school!

Demerit System



We use a demerit system in fifth grade. This is similar to what students will experience in middle school. Please read the following to familiarize yourself with the system.

Demerit System

1. Students receive demerits for violating class or school rules and for refusing to do assignments. (see list below)
2. Written demerit slips are given for each offense and parents are notified via **Class Dojo** when their child has received a demerit. A total of five demerits from any staff member will result in after-school detention, or in-school suspension if transportation cannot be arranged.
3. After accumulating five demerits, the student will receive disciplinary action: every 5 demerits = 1 after school detention, 20+ demerits = suspension & parent conference
4. At the end of the nine weeks, students who have not received a demerit for the quarter will be rewarded.

Demerits:

- Rude/Discourteous
- Lack of Class Materials
- Refusal to Complete Assignment
- Classroom Mischief

Cell Phones

Students are not allowed to carry cell phones on their persons at Ohio County Elementary-Middle School. **Any cell phone brought into the building must be turned off during school hours and kept in the student's locker. Students may not use their cell phones during school hours.** Violation of the cell phone policy may include but is not limited to:

1. First offense: 1 demerit
2. Second offense: after-school detention
3. Third offense: 2 after-school detentions
4. Fourth offense: Wednesday school
5. Fifth offense: 1 day of ACDC
6. Sixth offense: 2 days of ACDC

Violation will also result in the immediate confiscation of the phone. A staff member will take the cell phone to the office and the parent/guardian will be notified to pick up the phone from the office. Cell phone violations that involve sending, sharing, viewing, or possessing pictures, text messages, emails, or other material of a sexual nature will be turned over to the police as these activities are violations of state law.

AR – Quarterly Grade



Each quarter students are expected to **read books in their range** as determined by the STAR reading test. Students may read above their range, but **only one book below range (≤ 0.5)** may count towards their goal. Students' reading is expected to include nonfiction. The table below outlines quarterly nonfiction requirements.

Quarterly Nonfiction Book Requirement	
1st Quarter (August-October)	1 nonfiction book
2nd Quarter (October – December)	2 nonfiction books
3rd Quarter (January – March)	3 nonfiction books
4th Quarter (March – May)	4 nonfiction books

Two grades will be earned quarterly for AR:

- ✓ Comprehension
- ✓ Goal Percentage

AR grades will be collected the final week of each quarter.

AR Party

To qualify for the AR party each quarter, students will need:

1. **100% Goal (all books in or above range)**
2. **80%+ Comprehension**
3. **Quarterly Nonfiction Book Requirement (with a 70%+ quiz score)**

Pacing Guide

- We typically spend two days on a lesson. The first day I introduce the concept and we solve problems together both as a class and in small groups.
- On the second day, students work independently to solve problems, and I check for accuracy. After completing the lesson on Zearn (online program) that corresponds with and reinforces the lesson, students complete the assessment (exit ticket).

Daily Math Review & Additional Math Skills

In addition to the lessons in our textbook, we will work on other important math skills using our daily math review sheet at the beginning of class. Other math skills will be covered during RTI throughout the year, including timed tests on multiplication, division, improper fractions, mixed numbers, exponents, and percent.
